





curt deck chair

Swiss studio Bernhard Burkard assures this deck chair with no back legs is perfectly safe.

The Curt deck chair comprises a fabric seat slung between two diagonal legs with anti-slip feet and simply leans against a wall like a ladder. This desk chair is attractive in its simplicity. In combination with the environment it serve its purpose as a desk chair. To achive best stability, it needs to be leaned against walls or rails in a flat angle. The anti-slip coated stand provides safe grip on every surface. Even though it looks dangerous it provides comfort seating and relaxing in every occasion. The wooden frame-part is manufactured in a sheltered workshop.

The project mobile hospitality (Mobile Gastfreundschaft) pays attention to an important aspect of our design work - the responsibility and the self-initiative in public space. 
Every year the PS1 Gallery at the Museum of Modern Art in New York invites young emerging architects to propose a temporary structure for their courtyard.





x_module

x_module is a furniture that modelates a space. It is a mobile and adaptable element - alternative to orthogonal shelfs. Thanks to a multiplication it receives new functions and possibilities. It has its own character but accepts creativity. Main principle of this furniture is stappling and combining identical elements in different ways. It can be used as a slim vertical shelf with a use of 4 modules or as an extensive wall with 16 or more elements. Depending on configurations sculpturality of furniture vary. 3 modules create coffee table or a bench. Singular ones can be used as simple stools.



MAK stool was designed as a part of "Nomadic furniture 3.0. New Liberated Living? exhibition at MAK. During the long night of museums in Vienna (5th of October 2013) chmara.rosinka have built 200 stools together with 200 MAK visitors in three and a half hours. In the entrance hall of the museum they have set up an assembly line with moulds and tools to simplify the building process and separate the single steps from each other. So even children could build themselves a stool with a little help.
